

# 5th September 2025 Headteachers update

What a fantastic first week it has been! I feel incredibly proud to be writing to you as the new Executive Head and would like to thank you and all the children for making me feel so welcome. I can tell this is a fantastic school with a brilliant community so I am looking forward to get to know more people in the coming weeks and months. I am working hard to learn everyone's names – which is no small challenge! The children have been very patient with me and I hope within the next few weeks I will know every single one.

The children have settled back into school life brilliantly. Their positive attitude, enthusiasm for learning and impeccable manners have impressed me from day one. It is clear that Shilbottle is a school full of happy, hardworking pupils who are eager to give their best which means I am confident it is going to be a highly successful year!

Like with most new academic years we have made some small tweaks at the start of the term. Firstly, we have amended the timetable for the school. This will allow us to have a much more streamlined approach to teaching and a clear focus around the curriculum we are teaching each day. A new reading slot is now in place followed by dedicated time for english and maths. The afternoons will then be available for foundation subjects such as history, art or PSHE.

With the amendment to the timetables we have moved our assembly time to the end of the school day which will therefore impact the children leaving school at staggered times. Therefore, from Monday we are going to ask that all parents and carers collect their children from the main playground at 3.20pm and the teachers will bring the children to you. The playground is a much safer space for the children to leave school and for those with children in multiple year groups it now means they will all leave together. Please note Reception will still come out at 3.00pm onto the playground.

Another change we have introduced is around our celebration assemblies on a Friday. I love celebrating success so this will be continuing but in addition to the assembly, every week two children from each class will be chosen to join in a treat of Hot Chocolate with all the trimmings and cake or biscuits. The children seemed very excited about this when we told them in assembly on Tuesday. Who will be the first 6 children... keep an eye on Class Dojo next week!

I am genuinely excited for the year ahead and together with the staff team, I am committed to building on the many strengths of the school and ensuring every child flourishes both academically and personally. Please do not hesitate to get in contact or speak to me at any point if you have further questions or if you simply wish to introduce yourselves. I hope you have a great weekend, I am sure the children will be tired after the first week back - I certainly am!

They are forming good relationships and playing constructively together in new environments. They've demonstrated a fantastic can-do attitude and lots of teamwork. 



A warm welcome to our two new children who join us in Year 4. The children have really made them feel welcome.
