# **Classroom updates - Bluebell Class**

There has been a lot of excitement in Bluebell class this week, particularly with the arrival of snow!

In maths, Reception continues to explore numerals 1-5. They have been representing numbers to five using objects this week. Our Key Stage 1 children have just finished their unit on Place Value to 100 and their next unit will be 'Shape'.

In English, Reception and Year 1 have been drawing and writing about the traditional tale, 'The Gingerbread Man'. Year 1 have been composing sentences independently and our Reception children



have been practising letter formation of initial sounds alongside their drawings of characters. Year 2 have started a new book: 'Slug Life', a fun combination of non-fiction text delivered by fictional characters. So far, the children seem to be enjoying this book and they have impressed me with their engagement with the topic of slugs!



In PSHE, the class explored the objective: 'We can try new things and keep going'. The children gave good examples of trying new things such as "Learning to ride a bike" or "Going swimming for the first time". Following discussion about persisting through challenges, they attempted an online drawing tutorial, carefully following step by step instructions. We agreed that we might not get it right the first time, but we could always try again!

Because we've started to practise our nativity, the class have revisited the Nativity story in RE. Our Key Stage 1 children have demonstrated excellent recall of key elements of the story from previous learning and

our Reception children have been excited to learn all about it.

Nativity rehearsals continue. I will be sending cast roles to you via Class Dojo and some of our children will soon have lines to practise, which I will also send home. We have lots of costumes in school, so there will be no need to purchase anything. A small number of our cast members may need to wear their own clothes, but I will message parents of those children to give plenty of notice.

# **Classroom updates - Poppy Class**

A busy and productive week in Poppy Class as Christmas sneaks ever closer! "How many days until December?" has officially become our new favourite daily question! The arrival of the snow saw the excitement build higher!

We have moved on to multiplication and division in Maths, using arrays and focusing on the 2, 4, 5, and 10 times tables. The children continue to impress me with their growing knowledge of the multiplication facts. Our daily times-table speed practice also helps us to build confidence and fluency.

In English, we continued our class story. We researched pugs and used this information to write a non-chronological report, focusing on features such as clear subheadings, organised sections, present tense, and factual language.

Geography this week had us investigating why people chose certain places to settle, considering important features like easy access to water, good farmland, natural shelter, useful resources, and convenient transport links. Meanwhile, in PSHE, we explored personal space, including what it is, why it matters and how giving each other a little breathing room keeps everyone happy.

We recalled the various food groups in our Science lesson and then focused on the importance of a balanced plate and healthy eating. In RE, we have discussed why Christians are inspired to have faith and follow God and this led us on to researching the work of the Salvation Army.

PE took place indoors due to the weather, but we still developed our invasion games skills albeit in a restricted space! Miss Barber wasn't in for Music this week but we still rehearsed our Christmas carols.

#### **Maths Mastery**

We are feeling much more confident in Maths this week! We continued exploring multiplication, focusing on problem-solving and reasoning. The "lightbulb moment" for the class came when we discovered that we can make tricky questions easier by using the maths facts we already know. It's great to see that perseverance paying off.

#### **Inspiration & The Solar System**

Mrs. Slack's wondrous art lessons continued with a look at the incredible portrait artist, Sarah Biffin. Sarah was born without arms or legs but became such an accomplished artist that she painted for royalty! She is a true inspiration to us all.

Finally, we went from snow to space! We blasted off to the outer reaches of our galaxy to research the eight planets in our solar system, looking at all their similarities and differences.
