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Safeguarding

Our pupils know they can share any concerns and we have robust policies and procedures in place which underpin safeguarding. It is our paramount priority to keep all children healthy and safe.

Remember our Designated Safeguarding Leads (DSL) in school are **Mr Phillips, Mrs Blackhall and Mr Shaw**.



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What Parents & Educators Need to Know about MAKING FRIENDS ONLINE

In today's digital world, it's increasingly common for children to form friendships with people they've never met in person. While online connections can offer children a sense of belonging, they also carry significant risks. Around 19% of children aged 10 to 15 in England and Wales have chatted online with someone they've never met face to face. This guide offers expert advice for parents and educators on helping children navigate online friendships safely.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

ONLINE GROOMING THREATS
Predators can use games, chat apps or social media platforms to build relationships with children and gain their trust. They may quickly develop into grooming or exploitation. Between April 2017 and March 2023, UK police recorded nearly 34,000 online grooming offences – an 82% increase in just five years.

EXPOSURE TO INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT
Children may encounter distressing or explicit material while interacting with online contacts – especially via TikTok, Instagram or Snapchat. This is evidenced in a survey by the Children's Commissioner for England, which found that 49% of children aged 5 to 17 had seen content online that made them feel uncomfortable, worried or upset.

PRIVACY AND DATA RISKS
Children and young people often overshare personal details – such as where they live or go to school – without understanding the consequences. In fact, 44% of 10 to 15-year-olds in the UK have met up in real life with someone they'd only spoken to online.

COMPROMISED PERSONAL SAFETY
Meeting an online 'friend' in real life risks placing a child in serious danger. From abduction to extortion, the consequences can be devastating. Reports of children being harmed after such meetings are becoming increasingly common in the UK, highlighting the need for safeguarding intervention.

PSYCHOLOGICAL DISTRESS
Online harm – such as cyberbullying, grooming or exposure to disturbing content – can lead to long-term emotional issues, including anxiety, depression and PTSD. 'Reckless' gangs, who threaten to release sexual information about a person unless they pay them money, have reportedly targeted children as young as 11, leaving them traumatised and coerced.

LONG-TERM REPERCUSSIONS
Children exposed to harmful online relationships early on may develop unhealthy beliefs about relationships, consent, or self-worth. In a recent case, a 15-year-old posed as a girl on Snapchat to befriend children aged 10 to 16, manipulating them into sexual activity and causing profound emotional distress. One 15-year-old was sexually abused by a 15-year-old, highlighting the long-term psychological harm online friendships with strangers can cause.

Advice for Parents & Educators

TEACH SAFE ONLINE HABITS
Help children understand how to use privacy settings, protect their personal information, spot fake profiles, and report anything suspicious or concerning. Use pressure tactics. Encourage them to think critically about what they share – and whom they're talking to.

ENCOURAGE REAL-WORLD CONNECTIONS
Support children in building friendships through school, clubs, hobbies and activities in the real world. Strong offline relationships help reduce children's reliance on online platforms for social interaction, and can help them develop resilience and social confidence.

KEEP CONVERSATIONS OPEN
Let children know they can talk to you about their online life. Avoid reacting with anger or judgement, as this may prevent them from opening up in the future. A child who feels listened to is more likely to disclose problems before they escalate.

USE PARENTAL CONTROLS
Parental control settings on devices, games and apps can help manage screen time, filter out inappropriate content, and monitor activity. While no system is perfect, they provide a valuable layer of protection as children explore digital spaces.

Absence Procedures if your child is ill, please keep them at home until they are well enough to return to school. Please notify us by phone call or email before 9.15am if your child is to be absent, and continue to inform us on a daily basis if they continue to be ill.

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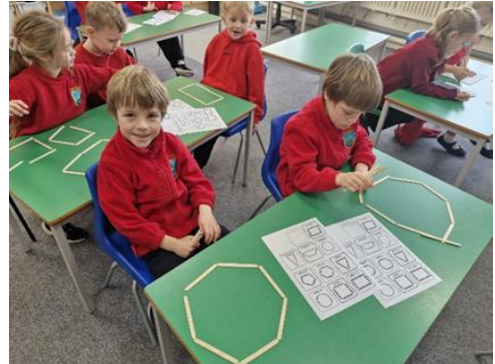
Classroom updates - Bluebell Class

We've had a very hands-on week in Bluebell class, with lots of practical learning taking place, particularly in maths.

Our Key Stage 1 children have been identifying 2-D and 3-D shapes. The children practised counting sides and vertices to help classify different shapes, and used lollipop sticks to build their own. This practical exploration really supported their understanding of the differences between regular and irregular shapes.

Our Reception children have been exploring the idea of "one more" and "one less" within 5. Bluebell class certainly has some enthusiastic singers, so we enjoyed reinforcing this learning through rhyming songs such as *Five Little Speckled Frogs* and *Five Currant Buns*. The children took turns exchanging pennies for currant buns and checking how many were left in the shop. Great fun and great maths practice!

In Key Stage 1 Geography, the children have been comparing Shilbottle to Newcastle. This week, they focused on the types of buildings and houses found in each location, confidently sorting examples into rural and urban categories. Our Reception children were eager to join in too, with many able to recognise famous Newcastle buildings and landmarks. The Centre for Life was especially popular!

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Classroom updates - Poppy Class

The first signs of Christmas have appeared in school, adding to the ever growing excitement. However, we continue to work hard in Poppy class. In Maths, we carried on working on our multiplication facts, with a focus on the 3, 6 and 9 times tables. In English, we continued reading *Pugs of the Frozen North*. We listened to a chapter of the story, used our imaginations and visualised what we heard. We then drew the scenes, annotating them with descriptive phrases. We had some fantastic pictures, which we added to our walking wall to help with our writing.

In PSHE, we explored different types of families and discussed how to identify and describe a range of relationships. We thought about the elements of a healthy, loving relationship; the children asked thoughtful questions and took part in mature discussions throughout. We continued our topic on settlements in Geography, where we compared villages, towns and cities, exploring the features they share and what makes them different.



In French, we looked at colours and practised our pronunciation through songs and class discussions, which reinforced our vocabulary in a fun and engaging way. PE took place indoors this week due to the weather, where we played partner direction games with NUFC and enjoyed a lively game of benchball, focusing on tactics to deter the opposition whilst avoiding the large Santa and Christmas tree in the corner of the hall!

We made Christmas tree decorations for the village tree and with our carol concert drawing nearer, we have been practising our songs with lots of enthusiasm and festive spirit.

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Classroom Updates - Clover Class

Another week has flown by, leaving us all wondering: how on Earth do we fit it all in? It has been a busy one in Clover Class, packed with fierce arguments, artistic masterpieces, and yes... biscuits!

We finally put pen to paper this week to write our discussion texts on the Kielder Dam. This topic has truly sparked the children's imaginations! We focused heavily on balancing the cost to local wildlife against the water needs of the human population. The children navigated these difficult arguments brilliantly, and their passion for the subject really shone through in their writing.

On Tuesday, excitement peaked when Mr. Phillips arrived bearing gifts: biscuits! However, we soon realized this was serious geography. We used the biscuits to understand the difference between Weathering (breaking the rock/biscuit) and Erosion (transporting the crumbs). We even saw wind erosion in action thanks to Joey T blowing crumbs across the table!

On Wednesday, we headed to Willowburn Leisure Centre. Mr. Phillips joined us this week and was incredibly impressed with the high standard of swimming in Clover Class. Everyone gave 100% effort!

We donned our detective hats this week to use our new superpower: **Etymology**. We discovered that by looking at the Greek roots of words, we can crack their meanings (and their spellings!). For

example, we learned that 'Geo' relates to Earth, and 'Ology' means 'the study of'. Put them together? Geology! It's a fantastic tool for building vocabulary.



With Mrs. Slack sharing her talents with the younger years, we welcomed a "Guest Artist" (Mr. Phillips) to help us finish our abstract portraits. We learned that the secret to watercolours is—you guessed it—controlling the water.

Finally, despite being tired by Friday, we squeezed in some Space Science. We explored the difference between Geocentric and Heliocentric theories.

Word of the Week: ENTHUSIASM *Meaning: Energetic interest and enjoyment.*

- **En** (Greek) = *Inside / Within*
- **Theos** (Greek) = *God / Spirit*

Historically, it means to have a "**spirit within**" you. The children certainly had plenty of spirit this week!
